

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Australia – Re-Emergence of Down Under



79% of students made it into a full-time job within three years of graduating. A further 6% were involved in further study, and 4% classed themselves as self-employed. That means that roughly nine out of ten international graduates from Australian universities were either in work or study three years after their degree had finished



Just 1 in 10 international graduates are unemployed after studying in Australia

- With 2 years of complete lockdown and border closures Australia is now bouncing back and so is the Australian economy thus making a huge demand in the job sector for skilled and unskilled graduates or a skilled-unskilled worker, providing a lot of opportunities
- Businesses are looking forward to international students as they play a vital role in their workforce, especially in the sectors like hospitality and healthcare
- Making the students career ready, Australian universities provide students with inbuilt certifications during their course and the government in Australia launched an employability hub for international students to learn and explore the opportunities available for them
- 88% employers in Australia believe communication and interpersonal skill more relevant than work experience

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

- Focusing on studies is very important in Ireland, also it is important to know when to apply for a job but most importantly when not to apply for a job or when not to approach to employers is very significant too
- Marrying technology with the environment is something Irish institutes are good in. Irish universities also have excellent research links and connections with other universities around the world. This kind of cross collaboration with many courses and curriculum gives an opportunity to build a truly international network during studies


Using 2019 graduates the data shows a typical outcome for a year's cohort of students: the majority 82% are in some form of education or employment, a further 5% go into caring for loved ones and/or travel, while the remaining 13% are unemployed, or unknown.




- The labor market in the UK right now is at a very strong position, there's huge demand for business management, data science, data analytics, FinTech roles and investment banking roles
- Green manufacturing, construction and digital marketing are the upcoming sectors with higher job opportunities in coming years
- With the growing demand and funding in sports, sports management courses are coming up as well
- Transferable skills are a big part of the UK jobs sector, approximately 80% of employers across the whole of the UK, offer that flexibility and openness to take on students with different degree backgrounds. They're looking for students who can reflect on their transferability
- The graduate route has facilitated opportunities for international students to find jobs in the UK and to be able to stay and work in the UK. The benefit of this visa is that students do not need sponsorship to stay back post their course completion

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United States of America – Keeping the American Dream Alive



The statistics for 2019/20 graduates demonstrates a typical outcome for a year's group of students: the majority (62%) are employed full-time, a further 10% are employed part-time or seasonally, 23% are unemployed, and the remaining 5% are unemployed.



- The number of highly skilled job vacancies has tripled in the past decade. International students grabbed approximately 460,000 jobs during 2019-2020
- In 2020, the total number of international students enrolled in US colleges was 1,095,299, making up 5.5% of the total US student body
- USA is known for its Silicon Valley thus making IT the key sector followed by automotive, financial services and data sciences. Robotics, aerospace, machinery, telecommunication, and Clean Technology are the growing sectors
- Opportunities are endless in the United States. There are numerous schools to choose from, as well as numerous fields of study and specialty degrees



Conclusion

Studying abroad is a unique and transformational learning experience. Students who have studied abroad are better able to work with people from other countries, understand the complexity of global issues, and have greater intercultural learning.

Employability is a journey and universities or the first employment after graduation are just the beginning of that journey.
